In its 28th year, Super Taikyu moves on to a new stage.





What is the Super Taikyu Series?

- Super Taikyu was launched in 1991 and has become one of the most important endurance races in Asia.
- Competing vehicles are commercially available cars with minimum modifications. They are classified by engine displacement and drive system. There are eight classes.
- The new class was introduced for FIA GT3 in 2011 and GT4. TCR in 2017.
- In recent years the series has attracted teams from Asia and other countries. The number of annual entrants has risen to about 60, the largest in Super Taikyu's history.
- In accordance with STO driver classification, teams are permitted to register up to six drivers at the Fuji 24 Hours and four drivers at each of the other races.
- This has traditionally been a competitor-focused event however we are now making an effort to increase the number of spectators. The attendance in 2018 increased by 28% from the previous year.
- Pirelli has become a series partner and the sole tyre supplier from 2018.
- In 2018 the first 24 hour Super Taikyu race was held at the Fuji Speedway again after ten years and was a great success. Also It was the first 24 hour event held at that circuit in 50 years.

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Mr. Akio Toyoda

President and member of the board of directors of the Toyota Motor Corporation competed in the final round in 2018 as driver named MORIZO. It was his first race in Japan.

"Having fun" is the most important part of this race.

A wide variety of cars compete against each other in the Super Taikyu. Nicknamed "S Tai", the series is loved by many fans. A number of amateur drivers also take part in the event, sometimes partnered with professionals. The close comradeship of amateur drivers' teams is often on display. Naturally, participants come to Super Taikyu to fight a serious battle but they never forget the joy of being part of a team. Both spectators and competitors alike are drawn to the uniquely relaxed atmosphere of Super Taikyu.





